CHAIRPERSON'S REPORT



Helping children is a powerful and transformative act that has the potential to shape lives and create a brighter future.

“If you have the means to give a vulnerable child love, care and stability – please do so. Sometimes we envision the mountain to be so much bigger than it is.” (Cape Town resident and foster mom, Moeshfieka Botha, quoted during Child Protection month on 10 May 2023)”

This year marks 123 years since the establishment of Marsh Memorial Homes after Mr William Marsh bequeathed a portion of his estate to his son, the Reverend Thomas Marsh, for the founding and maintaining of a Home for destitute children. For more than a century, Marsh Memorial Homes has touched the lives of children entrusted to our care. Testimonies of hope and transformation abound from past residents, families and staff members who have experienced loving hospitality, grace and nurture within the caring environment of Marsh Homes as it espouses the value that that all people have infinite worth in Christ.

Since the establishment of the Homes, many challenges have been encountered and the hard work required to overcome them has at times felt like climbing an insurmountable mountain. The many small steps that are taken every day with simple dedication and faithfulness have nevertheless enabled the Homes and its ministry to thrive. Highlights from the past year include the Founders Day Celebration Service in the historic Marsh Chapel, re-establishment of the children's forum with a focused programme on gender based violence, upgrade and installment of two computers into each of houses for use of the children and staff, renovation and renaming of the Milner House to Wesley House, renovation of bathrooms in Whalley and Gregory Boy Chapel, re-establishment of the s' Houses, various improvements and maintenance of the aging property, and the appointment of a professional company to run Social Media marketing and Website maintenance for the improvement of general communication of Marsh Memorial Homes within the public sphere. Ongoing work remains focused on the general running of the Homes as well the wellbeing and development of staff. I can confidently say that the children in our care remain our priority as we seek to fulfill our vision of nurturing children and transforming lives.

While the progress towards the renovation of Heatherdale House has been slow, I am pleased to report that the appointment of the Architectural Company, Heritage Consultant, Quantity Surveyor and other needed professionals, has been made under the expert eye of the project subcommittee. We are confident that the renovation work on the House will commence in the latter part of the year and possibly be completed in the following year. Consultation and conversation around the intended Child Care workers Training Programme is also underway, with the intended commencement date of the pilot programme in 2026.

The Management Board have met monthly to fulfill their responsibilities of good governance, due diligence and decision making for the Homes. I wish to acknowledge all members of the Board with deep appreciation for their commitment and enthusiasm. Each one offers their skill and time in extraordinary ways on an entirely voluntary basis. Sharing the same heart for the work of Marsh Homes from this dedicated team has made it a pleasure to exercise the responsibility entrusted to us. We owe a great debt of gratitude to our Board Treasurer, Mr Fred Jenkins, for his ongoing tireless efforts in managing and presenting the Finances of Marsh Memorial Homes in an open, transparent and diligent manner and I commend his Report for the past financial year. I wish to pay special tribute to Mrs Lesley Mostert as she completes her term of office on the Board. She has served in various responsibilities including that of Vice Chairperson, Secretary and Sub-committee convenor. Her eye for detail and attention to matters of compliance and future planning, as well as her unwavering commitment to Marsh Memorial Homes, has served us well, and we look forward to her continued support going forward.

It is said that inspirational leadership is the ability to be a positive influence on those around you and motivate others toward success. The Management Board is incredibly proud of the astute leadership and extraordinary dedication of the Revd Kevin Needham as Principal of Marsh Memorial Homes. Under his able leadership and calm spirit, the Homes are indeed well run and continue to strive for excellence in all areas of work. Appreciation is expressed also to all staff in every department for their tireless efforts and dedication to the Homes, and without whom the vision and mission of Marsh would not be possible.

The African proverb, "It takes a Village to Raise a Child" is indeed true for Marsh Memorial Homes. The work of the Home could never succeed without the amazing village of people who work both in and alongside the Marsh community. Marsh Training Center

As reported in the 2022 AGM report, we have a desire to contribute to the care for vulnerable children in our region through a training programme for Child and Youth Care Workers (CYCWs). This is in harmony with the current mission statement of Marsh Memorial Homes. It also aligns with our history where the Homes provided in-house training for childcare workers in an era when this was almost unique.

The concept is for residential training using the repurposed and refurbished Heatherdale House. Now that the building project is in the advanced stages, a subcommittee of the Board is meeting regularly to develop the incipient concept into a robust proposal. The members of the subcommittee hold a wide range of expertise and intend to consult other key people in the childcare arena.

The intention is to provide a developmental curriculum which will be broader than the standard course. Personal formation for students will be a strong priority forming a foundational aspect of the training. This will be carried through into the way the rest of the curriculum is approached. The main course will be a registered one fulfilling the legislated requirements for a CYCW qualification. The hope is that this will be taught with an orientation to residential care using facilitators experienced in residential care. The curriculum will also provide for learning additional insights and skills needed specifically in residential care for traumatised children.

As this vision moves towards the first phase, we are aware that this is a huge task. It will demand considerable resources across many spheres from people to finance to discernment.

During the year under review, we launched our Academic Support Programme, staffed by volunteers and aimed at addressing the educational challenges faced by many of our children. Our children often come from backgrounds where education has not been prioritised, and research indicates that in South Africa, a significant number of children are unable to read for meaning or comprehension. According to a 2021 Progress in International Reading Literacy Study (PIRLS) report, 78% of South African Grade 4 learners cannot read for meaning. Additionally, many of our children struggle with mathematics.

Our vision is to ensure that every child at Marsh Memorial Homes receives regular one-on-one time with a volunteer dedicated to assisting them with basic education and homework. This initiative is crucial for providing the children with the foundational skills needed to succeed academically and in life.

CHILDCARE HIGHLIGHTS

Aligned with our current registration under the Children’s Act 38 of 2005, Social Work and Child and Youth Care Work are the core functions of the Childcare Department at Marsh Memorial Homes.

1. Social Work

Providing Essential Care and Protection

Over the past year, Marsh Memorial Homes has served as a sanctuary for 61 children identified by the Children’s Court as needing care and protection. Our dedicated social workers play a critical role, offering therapeutic services to children removed from traumatic situations.



Therapeutic and Developmental Programmes

Registered under Sections 191(2) (a) (b) and 191(3) (b) (e) of the Children’s Act, our facility provides specialised therapeutic and developmental programmes for residential care. Psychosocial counselling is a cornerstone of our approach, offering essential support that addresses the emerging difficulties children face. This counselling alleviates immediate distress and trauma, helping children cope with the stresses of separation from their families, thereby promoting their holistic well-being and enabling them to make positive choices. holistic well-being and enabling them to make positive choices.

Circle of Courage

Our counselling sessions are guided by the ‘Circle of Courage’ model of youth empowerment, which focuses on four key areas: belonging, mastery, independence, and generosity. These essential growth needs are a natural part of human development.

Family Reunification

In accordance with Section 187 of the Children’s Act, we prioritise family reunification. This commitment is reflected in our statistics, which show significant numbers of children reunified with their biological parents or placed in foster care.

2. Childcare

Holistic Development and Nurturing

The Child and Youth Care department is pivotal in the development, nurturing, and transformation of children at Marsh Memorial Homes. Our approach involves engaging with children as whole individuals, promoting their social competence and healthy development through their everyday environments and life experiences, and building positive relationships.

Empowerment Through Programmes

Our child care staff implement programmes designed to equip children with mindfulness techniques for their current situations and skills for long-term community integration. These programmes cover life skills, value-based learning, educational support, outreach, and spiritual upliftment. They are integrated into our daily structured schedule to ensure each child gains the necessary skills to make healthy decisions.

Our dedicated team at Marsh Memorial Homes continues to provide invaluable support and care to children in need. By focusing on therapeutic interventions, developmental programmes, and family reunification, we strive to make a lasting positive impact on the lives of the children we serve.



FACILITIES HIGHLIGHTS

The Chapel Repairs and replacements of the slate roof tiles were completed by Naturally Slate in late May 2023. All asbestos gutters were replaced, the exterior walls were painted, and the windows waterproofed, resulting in a beautifully restored building.

Tree Pruning A major pruning and cut-back of all trees around Marsh was carried out to prevent any damage during the winter season. This project, performed by Krige Tree Services, cost R 39,100.00.

Pool Covers New hydraulic, fully automated pool covers were installed in January 2024. Although costly, these covers will provide long-term savings on chemicals and water loss.

Wesley House A revamp and clean-up of Wesley House was undertaken, with the help of volunteers from The First United Methodist Church in Brookings, South Dakota, USA. This house will initially be used as temporary accommodation while Whalley, Gregory, and later Thomas undergo renovations and a facelift.

Bathroom Upgrade - Whalley House A full bathroom upgrade, funded by kind donations, was undertaken. The upgrade of Whalley House is 90% complete, and we will proceed with Gregory House once the older boys are moved back.

Programme Material Storage Shed A group of volunteers from The First United Methodist Church in Brookings, South Dakota, USA worked hard to dismantle, refurbish, move, and re-erect an old shed from next to the laundry to next to Thompson House. This shed will be used for the storage of programme materials.

Wind-O-Wash A contract was signed with Wind-O-Wash to perform quarterly window cleaning at heights and gutter cleaning. They offered us a reduced rate as we are a care home.

Eveleigh House Inverter Installation Due to regular load-shedding disruptions, quotations for alternative power supplies for all buildings at Marsh were obtained. Sun Logic was found to be the most reasonable and professional. The initial installation in Eveleigh was completed at a cost of R 183,137.50. An additional R 2 million will be required to roll out alternative power supplies across all buildings, including solar panels on some.

Plumbing Much of the plumbing at Marsh is very old, resulting in constant water issues. We are endeavouring to repair and maintain the plumbing as best we can, despite the high costs involved.

Annual Market Our annual market was successfully held on 4 November 2023. This year, the location of the market will change due to the likely commencement of the Woodside development on the large field adjacent to the M5. Plans are already underway to reduce expenses and ensure a successful and enjoyable event.


Traffic Control We are currently planning a one-way circular traffic system, which will include new road markings, warnings, and speed curbing signs to enhance the safety of our children.

MARSH MEMORIAL HOMES FINANCIAL REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2024


Marsh Memorial Homes receives the bulk of its income from three main sources:

- The Department of Social Development,
- The William Marsh Will Trust and
- Donations from various sources.

In addition, funds are generated through the rental of properties, fund raising activities and interest earned on funds invested. Once again the annual market was a successful, generating more than R100 000. Of concern is the fact that state grants are not increasing in line with rising costs. This in turn requires the redemption of investment funds and pressure on obtaining other sources of income.

The operations for the year ended 31 March 2024 reflected an operating surplus of R19 000 (2023 - R89 000), with most of the expenses either on budget or, if not budgeted for, approved by the board. Staff turnover remains a concern and every effort is being made to bring staff salaries more in line with those paid in the private sector, as very often staff leave because of higher salaries being offered elsewhere.

Our appreciation and thanks are extended to all those who have continued to support the Home during the past year, both financially, in time given selflessly in raising funds and volunteering at the Home.

HEATHERDALE HOUSE LAYOUT PLAN



The first building that centres in your view as you drive through the entrance gates and into the Marsh grounds, is the Heatherdale House, previous known as Parker-Perth. It is a beautiful example of Edwardian architecture in South Africa and its impressive aesthetic makes it worthy of its prominent and focal position in the opulent, village style landscapes of Marsch Memorial Children's Home in Rondebosch, Cape Town.

Since 2022 a subcommittee of the board has been working towards the renovation of the building. The exterior of the house will be renovated and restored to its original form and the interior spaces will be restored or altered to accommodate the new use, respecting the classic style and bringing in vibrant new themes. The house will be able to provide medium term residential placement for students in the upstairs spaces, whilst the downstairs will be used as a training facility and the administrative requirements related to that. The house will also feature living courters for a dean and limited overnight accommodation for special visitors.

The process of selecting an architectural team for this project took the shape of a small competition in which three architectural practices were invited to provide a sketch plan and mood board to see who has the best understanding of the vision for the building. One architect withdrew in the last moments, so the selection pool was down to two. Both teams of architects presented their proposals and both were very impressive.

After careful consideration of various factors, Fusion Architects were appointed, lead by Stuart Alan and assisted by Jeandré Saaman.

The project kicked off with a comprehensive 3D scan of both the interior and exterior of the building. This means that a virtual 3D model of the Heatherdale House exists to look back at. This model was then used to generate architectural plans and elevations which were formed the platform from where the new design and layout was shaped.

A design process was followed and after various design and consulting meetings, a final design was confirmed that best suited the future use of Heatherdale House.

The next step was to obtain approval from all the relevant authorities, mainly Heritage Western Cape, and with the building being so valuable as a heritage resource, their possible objections had everyone at the edge of their seats. Thankfully the plans were approved by Heritage Western Cape, which meant that The City of Cape Town could proceed with their own processed of approval. The Heritage Western Cape approval also meant that the work intended for Heatherdale House is in keeping with character of the house and in support of the preservation of a valuable heritage resource.

The project is currently in the final stages of approval by the City and running parallel to that is the process of obtaining quotations from suitable contractors to take on the building work. The project aims to start construction before the end of 2024 and will reach completion towards the second half of 2025.

The project will partially be funded by proceeds from the sale of the Heatherdale Property and further fund raising and donations may be needed to successfully complete this exciting renovation.
