
CHAIRPERSON: YVETTE MOSES

Chairperson's Report

"Our children are our greatest treasure. They are our future. Those who abuse them tear at the fabric of our society and weaken our nation."

Recent high profile media cases of child trafficking, murder and abuse of children have shocked the nation, reminding us just how vulnerable our children have become. Statistics reveal that there have been significant increases in the numbers of children that are raped, abused, murdered, assaulted or harmed. In the Western Cape, assault and attempted robbery of children are amongst the highest reported violent crimes, with a direct correlation with gangsterism and precarious living conditions. Instead of experiencing safety, comfort and support within a healthy family life, many homes have become unsafe spaces in which children are hurt. The trauma and harm which has been inflicted on so many young lives will have far reaching impact on future generations. The work of Marsh Memorial Homes bears testimony that while the past cannot be changed, a different future is possible. Ever since the first child was received formally into our care on 12 January 1903, Marsh Memorial Homes has sought to fulfill a vision to nurture children and transform lives, so that a new narrative may emerge with a different future for our children.

The past year has been both challenging and rewarding. Despite the numerous challenges faced by a strained economy, decreasing financial support for children's residential care and donor fatigue, Marsh Memorial Homes has provided excellent care to the children entrusted to our care. Our dedicated staff have worked tirelessly to create a nurturing and supportive environment to enable the children to thrive. Good moments outweigh the difficult ones, and mundane tasks find new meaning when the excited laughter of children is heard after a special outing, a child proudly brings a good progress report from school or a child is reunified with their family.

I commend the various reports which speak about the activities and highlights of the past year, as well as the financial position of the Homes, under the watchful eye of our Board treasurer.

A significant part of the governance work of the Management Board has been meticulous revision and preparation of the Constitution, which stands ready for adoption by the Annual General Meeting. A major focus area has been the renovation project of what will become known as Heatherdale House. Having worked through the complexities associated with this heritage project, it is pleasing to report that after all the necessary approvals have been obtained, the work has been handed over to the approved tender, with preliminary construction work already commenced. Our next goal is the establishment of the Training Centre for Residential Childcare Workers Programme, with the pilot programme envisioned to commence in the near future with our own child care workers at Marsh Memorial Homes.

The success of Marsh Memorial Homes lies in the collaborative efforts of the Marsh staff, the Management Board, volunteers, donors and network of churches, organisations, service providers, individuals and partners, including the Department of Social Development, to whom we extend our heartfelt gratitude and appreciation. Special thanks are extended to the members of the Board, the Principal and Senior Social Worker Supervisor as well as all the Marsh staff, who serve in their respective roles with unwavering dedication and commitment.



Volunteer Programme Highlights

A key focus of our volunteer recruitment and training over the past year has been to strengthen our Educational Support Programme. This initiative forms a vital component of the structured daily programme at Marsh and plays a significant role in the academic and personal development of our children.

With our current staff-to-child ratio in each cottage at 1:10, it is simply not possible for one Child and Youth Care Worker to provide individualised attention to all ten children during homework and study times. We therefore rely heavily on our carefully screened and trained volunteers to ensure that homework is completed, school projects are attended to, remedial support is provided, and each child receives one-on-one reading assistance.

At present, we have 33 education support volunteers. However, we are actively seeking to grow this number—particularly to support our senior learners during Saturday morning study sessions.

Education Support Programme Schedule:

- ✓ **Junior Phase:** Monday to Thursday 14h30–16h40
- ✓ **Intermediate Phase:** Monday to Thursday 15h30–17h00
- ✓ **Senior Study Group:** Saturday 07h00–09h30



In addition to academic support, volunteers have continued to facilitate enrichment programmes such as fly fishing, cooking, and creative writing. These initiatives were evaluated at the beginning of 2025 to ensure alignment with our developmental themes and outcomes.

In January 2025, a volunteer-led Netball Programme was launched for children in Madeline and Thomas Houses. Sessions are held on Fridays from 17h00 to 18h30.

Furthermore, on 21 February 2025, a new Choir Programme commenced for the Intermediate Phase, led by a dedicated volunteer from Kendrick House.

We remain deeply grateful for the time, passion, and commitment of our volunteers, whose contributions continue to nurture and uplift the lives of the children in our care.



CHILD CARE

Empowering children to thrive through compassionate care and support

Children in need of care and protection are placed at Marsh Memorial Homes through the Children's Court, in accordance with Section 150 (1) (a) of the Children's Act 38 of 2005. As a Child and Youth Care Centre, Marsh Memorial Homes is fully aligned with our current registration under the Children's Act. The core functions of our childcare department focus on Social Work and Child and Youth Care Work, ensuring comprehensive support and guidance for the children in our care.

➔ Social Work

Over the course of the 2024-2025 financial year Marsh Memorial Homes provided residential care to an average of 58 children per quarter. Every child at our facility has access to psychosocial support from our dedicated residential Social Workers at least once a month. We cover a wide range of topics during therapeutic interventions, tailored to meet the individual needs of each child in accordance with their Individual Developmental Plan. Our sessions address essential areas such as victim empowerment, family therapy, grief and loss, trauma debriefing, career counselling, and sexual education.

Individual therapeutic sessions and support are crucial for children in need of care and protection. As an effective early intervention tool, counselling identifies and addresses the difficulties these children face. Therapeutic counselling aims to alleviate immediate distress and trauma, assisting children in coping with the separation from their family of origin and helping them adapt to new environments. In this context, counselling fosters the holistic well-being of children and empowers them to make positive choices for their futures.

With heartfelt gratitude for our generous external donors, we have transformed our play therapy room into a vibrant sanctuary where children can openly express their emotions and cultivate essential coping skills through the power of play. This therapeutic approach is particularly beneficial for children removed from parental care and placed in a Child and Youth Care Centre, especially for victims of trauma, abuse, or neglect. It offers them a precious opportunity to process their experiences and build resilience.



➔ Family Reunification

In accordance with Section 187 of the Children’s Act, which emphasizes the prioritisation of family reunification for children, the Social Work and Child Care Department is committed to this important objective. Within this framework, the reunification process at Marsh Memorial Homes is facilitated through a collaborative and multidisciplinary approach. The Residential Social Worker (RSW) collaborates closely with the Designated Social Worker (DSW) to ensure ongoing communication and engagement with the child, their parents or guardians, and extended family members. An individualised reunification plan is created and routinely evaluated, encompassing therapeutic support, capacity-building for parents, and services aimed at strengthening the family unit. As a result, the facility has achieved significant success in the reunification of children over the past year. This achievement is highly regarded, as a residential facility is intended to serve as a temporary placement for orphans and vulnerable children, and can never substitute for the nurturing environment provided by a loving family.

➔ Fostering healing and growth



The Marsh programmes have been effectively incorporated into the children’s daily routines to create a nurturing environment that addresses their physical, emotional, cognitive, and social needs. The developmental, recreational, physical, and spiritual initiatives offered at the facility contribute significantly to the overall well-being of the children, equipping them with essential skills and competencies necessary for self-management, social interaction, and successful reintegration into society. During the reporting period, new and existing initiatives were launched, alongside various enhancements implemented across existing programs. In September 2024, a new programmes supervisor joined the team, bringing with him a strong commitment to the welfare of children and the mission of Marsh Memorial Homes. This individual introduced innovative ideas and demonstrated a proactive approach to advancing the organisation’s goal of “transforming children and changing lives”.

Facilities Report

Marsh Memorial Homes Mission statement 2019.

Our facilities team have worked tirelessly in order to ensure that our campus and buildings are cared for in a way that fulfils our mission.

During the period under review we completed the following major maintenance projects:



TREE MANAGEMENT

■ Krige Tree Specialists carried out our annual pre-winter trimming. All cuttings were chipped on site and spread as mulch across the garden beds.



PAVING OF SANDY AREAS

■ Unsightly sandy patches were paved at the rear of Gregory House, the side of Thomas House, and beside the Eveleigh House office, greatly improving these surroundings.

RIDE-ON MOWER REPLACEMENT

■ Persistent delays in sourcing spares for the Husqvarna ride-on mower hindered field maintenance. With the aid of generous donors, we have ordered a John Deere S120, supported by reliable after-sales service.

IRRIGATION UPGRADES

■ The front lawns, and the previously arid beds in front of Whalley, Gregory, and Wesley Houses now benefit from a repaired and extended irrigation system. The improvement is already evident.



KITCHEN EQUIPMENT

■ The industrial gas stove in the main kitchen became uneconomic to repair owing to obsolete parts. A Vulcan stove has been installed funded by generous donations, with assured technical support.



NORTON WAY GUARDHOUSE

■ The Auria Woodside guardhouse project is progressing well. Once operational we will have a second line of security. The Facilities Supervisor conducts daily external inspections and attends fortnightly site meetings to protect our interests. Completion is expected by the end of July 2025.



FIELD DRAINAGE AND LEVELLING

■ The area opposite the netball court has been raised, levelled, and edged with retaining blocks, creating an additional play zone and an improved site for market rides. The new storm-water drainage system has eliminated flooding of roads and sand blocking our storm water system.



PLAY THERAPY ROOM

■ The upstairs kitchen in Eveleigh House has been redecorated and converted into a dedicated play therapy room. The space has been furnished appropriately and enhanced with child-friendly murals and new carpeting to create a warm, welcoming environment for therapeutic work.



INVERTER INSTALLATIONS

■ To ensure uninterrupted operations, inverters have been fitted in Eveleigh House (main office block) and in the Chapel.

WALK-IN FREEZER

■ A donated walk-in freezer will allow us to retire multiple stand-alone units and maintain a larger, more efficient stock of perishable foods.

HEATHERDALE HOUSE RENOVATION

■ By the time of the Annual general meeting the site will have been handed over to the contractors with work on the heritage building scheduled to commence shortly, with completion targeted for April 2026.



CHAPEL SOUND EQUIPMENT

■ The sound system in the chapel has been upgraded and now includes a wireless mixing desk able to fully accommodate the worship groups who lead the children's service every Sunday. This was generously funded by The First United Methodist Church of Brookings.




CHILDREN'S COMPUTERS

■ We were able to install two computers in each house to allow children access for home work, and research projects



These improvements strengthen the estate's infrastructure, enhance safety and efficiency, and provide a restorative environment for our children and staff.



Building a Brighter Future: The Renovation of Heatherdale House and the Establishment of the Marsh Memorial Homes Child and Youth Care Training Programme



In a year marked by determined progress, Marsh Memorial Homes is proud to report on two major strategic initiatives: the long-anticipated renovation of Heatherdale House and the establishment of a much-needed Child and Youth Care Worker Training Programme. Together, these projects represent an investment not only in infrastructure but in the future of residential childcare in South Africa.




Heatherdale House: Restoring with Purpose, Building for Tomorrow

The renovation of Heatherdale House has been a journey of patience, perseverance and purpose. During the year under review, the dedicated subcommittee diligently navigated the complex and often frustrating processes required to move the project forward — from securing heritage approvals and meeting regulatory requirements to appointing the necessary professionals to carry out the work.

While unavoidable delays prevented us from commencing physical work during the reporting period, we are pleased to announce that all approvals have now been granted. The tender process has been successfully completed, a contractor appointed, and the site officially handed over for construction. If all progresses according to plan, we anticipate completion by the end of April 2026, at a projected cost of R12,500,709.

Heatherdale House is not merely being restored — it is being reimagined. Once completed, it will provide both residential accommodation and flexible learning spaces, equipped to host both short and long-term courses designed specifically to train child and youth care workers for the residential care sector. Significantly, the building has been designed with adaptability in mind: should the need for training change in future, Heatherdale will be fully equipped to accommodate additional children in our residential programme. This is restoration with purpose — a legacy investment in both place and people.





Training that Transforms: The Marsh Memorial Homes Child and Youth Care Worker Training Programme

At the heart of everything we do is our commitment to nurturing children and transforming lives. Central to this is the quality of care they receive — and that depends directly on the training, support, and development of our child and youth care workers.

All of our care workers hold at least a matric certificate and an NQF Level 4 or 5 childcare qualification, or in some cases, a Bachelor’s degree. Yet despite their credentials, there remains a significant gap between academic theory and practical competence within residential settings. Current qualifications are often designed for a wide range of care contexts, leaving graduates ill-prepared for the unique challenges of life in a child and youth care centre. Moreover, many arrive at the workplace with their own unresolved trauma, limiting their ability to effectively support the children in their care.

At Marsh, we have long invested in the continuous development of our staff. However, we now recognise the need for a formalised training programme that addresses these specific gaps — equipping child and youth care workers with both theoretical knowledge and the practical, emotional and interpersonal skills essential for high-quality residential care.

Our training programme’s first objective is clear: to supplement the NQF 4/5 curriculum with essential modules focused on residential care. These modules will be trialled with our own care staff before being offered more widely, in collaboration with accredited training providers. In the longer term, we are also exploring potential partnerships to support the delivery of the full Bachelor’s degree, currently only available through one South African institution.



Getting Started: Laying the Foundation

We already have the premises: an underutilised building on our campus is being refurbished into a fit-for-purpose training facility. To bring this vision to life, our immediate need is funding for a short-term “Conceptor” role — an experienced curriculum designer who will spearhead the design, negotiation, and funding strategy over a nine-month period. We are also seeking members for a dedicated voluntary oversight committee.



As the programme grows, further investment will be required to employ experienced facilitators and trainers. However, with strong foundational planning and support, we are confident that this initiative will become a cornerstone of residential childcare training in the region.



Looking Ahead: A Training Hub for the Sector

The potential is vast. Once operational, our facility could become a national training hub — offering not only foundational modules for residential care but also voluntary upskilling opportunities for those working in foster care, cluster foster care, and secure care centres. In time, we hope to offer leadership and management training for those establishing and running child and youth care facilities.

This is more than a training programme. It is an act of hope — a commitment to excellence, to innovation, and most importantly, to the children and young people who depend on our care.



MARSH MEMORIAL HOMES

FINANCIAL REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2025

Marsh Memorial Homes receives the bulk of its income from three main sources:

- The Department of Social Development,
- The William Marsh Will Trust and
- Donations from various sources.


In addition, funds are generated through the rental of properties, fund raising activities and interest earned on funds invested. Once again the annual market was a successful, generating more than R220 000. Of concern is the fact that state grants are not increasing in line with rising costs. This in turn requires the redemption of investment funds and pressure on obtaining other sources of income.

The operations for the year ended 31 March 2025 reflected an operating loss of R192 000 (2024 - R19 000). While this may seem alarming at first, cash resources are managed on a daily basis. Donations received for specific projects are not brought to income until the funds are disbursed. Accordingly, while the cash is received the donation reflects as a balance sheet item. While that cash is in the bank, investments are not redeemed, giving the impression that there is a shortfall. Once the expenditure is incurred in the new year, the investments will be redeemed and the apparent loss will be recouped. Most of the expenses either on budget or, if not budgeted for, approved by the board.


